Why this matters: accurate syllable counting supports clear public speaking and pronunciation, poetry and songwriting (meter), proofreading and editing, and second-language pronunciation practice. This worksheet moves from vocabulary practice into applied writing exercises.

Part 1: Multisyllabic Vocabulary

Part 2: Homographs and Stress Shifts

Answer Key — Counting Syllables (Adults)

Part 1:

entrepreneurial=7, bureaucracy=4, idiosyncrasy=5, reconciliation=6, unprecedented=5, collaboration=5, infrastructure=4, sustainability=6, parliamentary=5, interoperability=8, hierarchical=5, quintessential=5

Part 2: RE-cord (noun) vs re-CORD (verb); PRES-ent (noun) vs pre-SENT (verb); OB-ject (noun) vs ob-JECT (verb). All three pairs keep 2 syllables each; only the stress shifts.

Part 3: Sentence 1 ≈ 24 syllables, could revise to: "The deadline is close, so we should speed up our timeline." (≈13 syllables). Sentence 2 ≈ 24 syllables, could revise to: "Most participants responded favorably to the proposal." (≈15 syllables). Sentence 3 ≈ 26 syllables, could revise to: "Because of the delay, the committee postponed the meeting." (≈15 syllables). Exact counts will vary by phrasing chosen.

Part 4: Both sample lines contain 10 syllables each, following the unstressed/stressed iambic pattern. Check original lines for a 10-syllable count.
